- The head of the Agency for Coordinating Technical Assistance to Ukraine, Lada Pavlikovska, is expected to visit Canada some time at end of this year. Among the topics to be discussed are closer ties and a growing relationship between the Agency and CIDA.
- Ukraine's Minister of Agriculture, P. Haidutsky, is to visit
 Quebec to participate in a Conference on the occasion of
 the 50th Anniversary of FAO at the end of October to
 discuss the possibilities of Ukraine becoming a member of
 the organization.
- One-time Minister of Agriculture of Canada Eugene Whelan
 is currently spending a number of weeks in Ukraine,
 working on the questions of reform of the agriculture
 sector on the road towards a market economy. This trip is
 the fulfilment of an offer by Prime Minister Jean Chrétien
 to President Kuchma during his visit to Canada one year
 ago.
- Ukraine's Minister of Health, Dr. Korolenko, and the President of the Academy of Medical Sciences of Ukraine, Dr. Vozianov, will be in Canada between November 13 and 22 to meet with their counterparts in Saskatchewan, British Columbia, and Ontario. In the latter, they will both address the Second Canadian Conference on International Health in Ottawa on Nov. 15. Dr. Korolenko's topic will be "Building Capacity for Health Reform", while Dr. Vozianov will speak on "The State of Medical Sciences in Ukraine". (For further information, call (613) 230-2654)
- A business delegation with representatives of banks and other enterprises from the Dnipropetrovsk and Donetsk regions of Ukraine will be arriving in Ottawa in November. Organized by Dnepr - Consult in Ukraine and hosted by East-West Enterprises in Canada, the 17-person's delegation's goal is to make contacts with potential partners while learning about business practices in Canada.
- A Coordinating Committee has been set up at the instructions of the Cabinet of Ministers of Ukraine to lay the groundwork for an international conference of private investors in Ukraine. At the head of this working group is the deputy minister for Foreign Economic Relations, I. Podolev. For further information, Canadian businessmen and investors should contact either Mr. M. - The Canadian Embassy in Kyiv, announced a major Canadian trade show focusing on Ukraine. "Ukraine and Partners XX-XXI" is due to be held in the Metro Toronto Convention Centre April 30 May 3, 1996, and Ukrainian and Canadian businesses are already invited to participate. This private sector initiative was established to develop economic cooperation between Ukrainian and other East European businesses with their Canadian, U.S. and Mexican partners.
