
Kharkiv, Dontesk and Dnipropetrovsk to assess needs and partners.

- Also under the auspices of CUPP, a team from the Canadian Bureau for International Education was in Kyiv, Lviv and Kharkiv December 3-15 to select local organizations for the Partners in a Civil Society project. Team leader Oksana Kowalchuk of CBIE, accompanied by Dr. François Bélisle of St. Francis Xavier University and Dr. Merlin Brinkerhoff of the University of Calgary met with the Embassy to discuss where and how Canadians could help their Ukrainian counterparts strengthen the institutions of a civil society.
- In cooperation with Mystetstvo Art Publishers, the Embassy hosted the December 14 launch of an albumformat study of the life and works of Leo Mol, one of Canada's leading contemporary sculptors. The evening also marked the Ukrainian premiere of the National Film Board's documentary Leo Mol in Light and Shadow.
- Guy Goulard, Commissioner for Federal Judicial Affairs, led a judicial reform mission to Kyiv January 11-24, 1996. The Canadian team, which included Chief Justice Ben Hewak of the Manitoba Supreme Court and Frank McCardle, Executive Director of the Canadian Institute for Advanced Legal Studies, met with Justice Minister Serhiy Holovaty, Head of the Supreme Court Vitaliy Boyko, and other senior justice decisionmakers. The mission's achievements were summed up in a protocol signed between Canada's office of Federal Judicial Affairs and Ukraine's Ministry of Justice and Supreme Court on cooperation in reforming and strengthening the Ukrainian judicial system.
- Nine Ukrainian officers were in Canada in January 1996, to start a six-month English course at Camp Borden, sponsored by the Dept. of National Defence MTAP program. The Embassy also manages the Kyiv intake for DND courses in French, peacekeeping, and flight safety.
- Roman Lishchynski, a veteran Canadian foreign service officer, turned in his papers as senior attaché at the Canadian Embassy on Jan. 6 for a post at the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe. The following Monday, Jan. 8, Lishchynski took over as head of the OSCE mission to Ukraine. The Organization almost immediately called him to Vienna for four days in preparation for his new role. Lishchynski, whose not-so-secret vice is archeology, is known as a very savvy and witty observer of developments in Ukraine, having spent the best part of the last four years there.
