## World Congress of Ukrainians Meets in Kyiv



Kyiv, Aug. 21-24, 1997... Some 2,000 ethnic Ukrainians from 46 countries gathered in Kyiv for the Second World Congress of Ukrainians. The four-day forum, titled "In Cooperation and Unity We Enter the 21st Century," brought together Ukrainians from 46 countries to review the work of the Ukrainian World Coordinating Council (UWCC), the umbrella body for Ukrainian organizations worldwide, and chart a course of global activity into the 21st century.

In an opening address, President Kuchma called on the Ukrainian diaspora to exercise influence on their governments to contribute to Ukraine's economic recovery. Participants discussed the survival of Ukrainian ethnicity and preservation of the Ukrainian culture, as well as the political and economic consequences of Ukraine's

Air Canada and Lufthansa offer up to three times daily non-stop service between Toronto and Frankfurt, and daily non-stop service between Vancouver-Frankfurt, and Calgary-Frankfurt. In addition, Montreal/ Halifax-Frankfurt service will be expanded next year. These flights will connect in Frank-

## Cdn. Professional/Business Federation Discusses Community's Future

Calgary, Aug.1-4, 1997... The direction of Canada's Ukrainian community in the 21<sup>st</sup> century was the principle issue discussed at the 1997 biennial convention of the Ukrainian Canadian Professional and Business Fed-

eration (UCPBF). Some 135 reps from chapters coast-to-coast participated.

The convention elected a new executive headed by Calgary journalist Donna Korchinski, who replaces Torontonian Raya Shadursky, thus becoming the second woman to hold that post.

Among resolutions adopted were several dealing with issues of youth involvement, commemoration of the Canadian government's internment during World War I, and Internet communications.

The tone was set during the opening plenary session, which emphasized "nation-building," based upon a concept adopted by Saskatchewan's Ukrainian community. In his address, Adrian Boyko, Sask. UCC Council President, said the organized community is in decline. "It is possibly on the way to extinction in Canada, unless we take our rightful place in this society and play our true role as nation builders."

A subcommittee of the UCPBF and the Ukrainian Canadian Congress has identified five key issues for the Ukrainian community: immigration, multiculturalism, foreign relations, bilateral relations and final resolution of the internment issue.
